



- Cyprus is an island in the eastern Mediterranean Sea, where the East meets the West.
- It is the third largest island in the Mediterranean, with an area of 9,251 square kilometers.

Cyprus gained independence from the colonial rule of the British Empire in 1960.

It is a well developed tourist destination, visited by thousands of tourists every year. The islands largest airport, Larnaca International Airport, is located on the outskirts of the city to the south











## Katharis-Dimitris Liperti Primary School



## Katharis-Dimitris Liperti Primary School

The school was named in honour of one of the most prominent poets of the island, Dimitris Liperti.

Dimitris Lipertis wrote poems mostly using the Cypriot dialect in which he described many aspects of the local folklore.



## Katharis-Dimitris Liperti Primary School

 The term "Katharis" refers to the transition of the area in which the school was built, from a local dump site to a thriving newly developed district. In our school there are 300 pupils aged between 6-12 years old. In actual fact 8% of the total student body come from immigrant families, primarily asylum seekers, from Middle Eastern countries. Approximately 20% of the student body come from families with one or both parents' first

generation citizens of non-Greek speaking European countries.



There are a total of 14 classes with 20-25 students each. The school staff includes: the headteacher, three deputy headteachers, 20 teachers, 1 special education teacher and 2 part-time teachers that assist various students with learning difficulties.
